Business management at MacEwan gives you options—complete a business management diploma or specialize in aviation or insurance and risk management.

Each stream results in a diploma you can use to transfer into the third year of Bachelor of Commerce or receive credit towards a Bachelor of Arts.

BUSINESS MANAGEMENT DIPLOMA

MacEwan.ca/Management

This major is designed for maximum flexibility, with various study options: online, full time, part time, day and evening.

Gain foundational knowledge in management, accounting, finance, human resources, communications and business law, and study electives such as sales, international business and entrepreneurship to take your business career in any direction you choose.

Choose to exit with a certificate after completing 10 specified courses or complete the diploma.

AVIATION MANAGEMENT MAJOR

In addition to your business courses, you will complete required aviation and ground school training through Transport Canada-approved training centres.

The following Transport Canada-approved aviation credentials are required to receive 15 credits towards your diploma to graduate: Private Pilot's Licence, Instrument Rating, Commercial Pilot's Licence, Multi-Engine Rating OR Instructor Rating.

Choose to exit with a certificate after completing 10 specified courses or complete the diploma.

INSURANCE AND RISK MANAGEMENT MAJOR

This major is accelerated with continuous study for 13 months.

Gain a solid foundation in business through courses in management, finance, communications and accounting while specializing in the areas of insurance principles, underwriting and claims.

This program prepares you to write the Insurance Institute of Canada exams. The curriculum also includes eight of the 10 courses required by the Insurance Institute of Canada (IIC) toward the Chartered Insurance Professional (CIP) designation.

HUMAN RESOURCES MANAGEMENT MAJOR

Gain the expertise essential to leading businesses through a variety of challenges, including strategic planning, labour negotiations, employee recruitment and retention and risk assessment.

This major's curriculum was developed to align with the Required Professional Capabilities as established by the Canadian Council of Human Resources Associations (CCHRA), and will prepare you for the National Knowledge Exam (NKE), a primary requirement of the Canadian Human Resources Professional (CHRP) designation.

INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS MAJOR*

This major provides you with the skills and knowledge needed to meet the demands of today's global market. Topics of study may include diversity and intercultural communications, international finance, global politics and an additional language.

For all programs which offer acceptance to students under the Mature Category of admission, as per Admission Policy C5010, clause 5.3, “to be eligible for Mature Admission, applicants must be a Canadian citizen or Permanent Resident, at least 20 years of age or older and out of full-time high school for at least twelve (12) months prior to the beginning of the intake term.” Mature applicants who present post-secondary courses may also have to meet a minimum average requirement as noted in the program-specific admission criteria. Mature applicants may also be required to complete academic requirements. Additional academic requirements for students seeking acceptance under the Mature Category of admission, beyond the aforementioned clause, are listed in the Mature Admission column.

SAE Skills Appraisal – English. These programs offer the option for students to complete a Skills Appraisal exam if they present English 30-1 below 65% or English 30-2 below 75%. Bachelor of Social Work degree permits completion of a Skills Appraisal exam if a student presents English 30-1 below 65% or ENGL 111 below a C-. SKM Skills Appraisal – Math. These programs offer the option for students to complete a Skills Appraisal exam if they present Mathematics 30-1 or Mathematics 30-2 or Applied Math 30 below 65%. Hearing Aid Practitioner diploma permits completion of a Skills Appraisal exam only if a student does not present a 20-level Math course (or equivalent) with minimum 50%. P Police Information Check. Applicants offered admission to these programs are required to present a clear Police Information Check (or equivalent from another policing agency) that includes a Vulnerable Sector Search. + Additional Options for Regular Admission in Absence of High School Diploma.
