What is a pathway?

Pathway programs are tailored for international students and prepare you for success at University.* UNSW Global pathways^ include Foundation Studies Programs, Diploma Programs and English Language Courses. These programs and courses are designed to give you the academic knowledge and English language skills needed to meet the entry requirements to a university degree, while making your transition into UNSW Sydney as smooth as possible.

Who is it for?

Students who want to study a bachelors degree but have missed out on direct entry because they haven't finished high school, their qualifications are not recognised, they have not met the entry criteria, or they need some additional English tuition.

Progression to UNSW

When you successfully complete your pathway program, and meet the grade point average (GPA) and English language requirements, you will gain entry to your chosen UNSW bachelors degree. If you are studying Foundation Studies and do not meet the GPA required to enter first year, you may have the option to complete a Diploma Program before progressing to second year at UNSW.

Private Rental

For many this is more affordable and more flexible option for students. Costs can vary depending on location, condition and the number of rooms. Typically, costs range from A\$150 - \$300 per student, per week in a shared house or apartment.

Colleges

Choose from full board, partly catered, or self-catered accommodation. There is also a range of gender-specific options including male-only, female-only and mixed. Most colleges cater for dietary requirements like halal, kosher and vegetarian.

Apartments

Apartments offer more of an independent style of living. There are apartments on and off-campus and costs vary depending on the number of rooms and the location.

Your home away from home

UNSW Global is one of Australia's most experienced education and care providers for international students who are under 18 years of age. We have carefully selected accommodation options for you, with systems and processes in place to support your safety and wellbeing. If you are an under 18 student, we can support you with appropriate accommodation and welfare arrangements which are required before you can be granted a student visa.

Get the right support while you're studying in Australia

To provide care that best supports your study, safety, accommodation and welfare needs, we work closely with:

- You
- Your parents
- Your teachers
- Accommodation providers
- Student Support teams
- Other service providers

The UNSW Global Student Support team is highly trained in the unique needs of younger students. Student Advisers follow a specifically designed care program to make sure that you have the best possible experience in Australia.

As a student, you'll experience:

- A customised Orientation Program that includes specialised workshops to help you settle into your new study and home life.
- Regular one-on-one Student Adviser consultations, where you can discuss personal, enrolment and accommodation issues.
- Regular feedback on your academic progress and attendance, including communication with your teachers.
- Access to UNSW services including counselling and psychological services, UNSW social and student clubs and relevant events.

Parents will receive:

- Parent Information Sessions in English or Mandarin by our Student Advisors.
- Results and Progress Reports detailing their child's progress and personal welfare within our Foundation Studies or Diploma Programs.
- Assurance that their child will be supported and monitored by our Student Support staff throughout the year.

How to apply for your Student Care Program

Step 1

Choose one of the below Care Arrangements options:

1. Live in Sydney with your parent/legal guardian or other relative who agrees to take care of you. If you choose this option You must first nominate the relative through the Department of Home Affairs (DHA). Visit immi.homeaffairs.gov.au/visas/getting-a-visa/visa-listing/student-500/welfare-arrangements-students-under-18
2. Apply to UNSW Global for Confirmation of Appropriate Accommodation and Welfare. With this option you will have to live in UNSW Global Approved Accommodation. You can choose to live in:
 - UNSW Global approved student accommodation (see pages 18 - 21), under additional supervision and care by our Accommodation team, or
 - a selection of UNSW Global approved homestay providers including Oz Homestay, Homestay Network, Global Experience, Study Vision, Auzzie Families, Australian Homestay Network.*

Step 2

- Submit your application, your Confirmation of Appropriate Accommodation and Welfare (CAAW) form and proof of your accommodation arrangements in Sydney.

Step 3

- After careful consideration we will issue a CAAW letter, confirming we have approved your accommodation and will provide support and care.

Step 4

- Apply for your student visa, with your CAAW approval letter and appropriate accommodation and welfare arrangements in place. For more information, visit unswglobal.unsw.edu.au/application/under-18
