


Inform your art and design.

(Don't miss Gallery Hop on the first Saturday of every month or HighBall Halloween, the country's largest costume party.)


CITY LIFE



Affordability was the driving factor to choose CCAD for Maryland native Colleen Clark. "I am absolutely confident that it ended up being the best choice though," she said. "I went through all of high school believing I was weirder than everyone in the world. CCAD allowed me to feel like I fit in for one of the first times in my life, which allowed me to make real friends and learn valuable things from the people around me."

Colleen also found an immediate connection with Columbus. She found the city to be full of weird and wonderful surprises, like the night a friend showed her the "secret" bowling alley where he worked, hidden in the basement of a nearby rec center.

Now working in her dream job at Cartoon Network, Colleen credits CCAD for her success. "I would never have made the amazing connections I have today," she said. "I have gotten all of my meaningful job opportunities through recommendations from peers and professors."

MIKE ALTMAN

Class of 2000, Animation Technical Character Director, Pixar

After immigrating to the U.S. from Ukraine as a toddler in 1979, Mike Altman grew up feeling grateful to his parents for giving him a better life. Since then, Mike has become a huge star in the world of animation. He's currently the Technical Character Director at Pixar. His work can be seen in the hit films *Cars 2* and *Inside Out*, which he worked on for two years before the film won an Oscar.

"When (writer) Pete Docter accepted the Academy Award for Best Animated Feature Film for *Inside Out*," Mike said, "it was one of the most exciting moments in my career."

Those kinds of career milestones wouldn't be possible if not for Mike's time at CCAD.

"At CCAD, the training and education I received set me on the path toward my career," Mike said. CCAD "allowed me to make the professional connections that have gotten me interviews and jobs over the years, and most fundamentally it gave me the foundation of my artistic view of design."

DAN MCKEWEN

Class of 2006, Fine Arts Owner, Seagull Bags @ @seagullbags

Dan McKewen owns, runs and designs for Seagull Bags.

"I was at Target and there was a seagull in the parking lot," he explains. "Just one seagull by itself." At the time, Mckewen points out, all the cycling brands were in San Francisco and Seattle. It seemed like an anomaly for one to pop up in Columbus, just like that parking lot seagull.

McKewen credits Columbus with his success. "We've gotten a lot of support from the community," he says.

He found a similar community at CCAD. McKewen feels like the work ethic is strong across both the faculty and the student body, bringing real legitimacy to an arts curriculum that people might otherwise dismiss.

"At the risk of sounding like I'm getting paid to do PR or something," he says, "I really do think it's a unique place."

That work ethic has helped McKewen grow Seagull Bags into a thriving business with orders coming in from around the world.

CCAD helped to give me the skills and the creative capacity to carry out the rest of my career as a designer. I'm a toy designer and inventor and recently started my own company. I went back to teaching because there are a lot of instructors who mentored me along my way, and I wanted to replicate that experience for others.

Designers Charles and Ray Eames cultivated a distinct design philosophy that influenced every aspect of their work — from their iconic lounge chair to their graphic design. Focusing on their films, this paper will examine the ways in which the Eames' aesthetic and design philosophy was reflected in the language, imagery, and narrative of their films. In Toccata for Toy Trains the Eames' design philosophy is reflected in the romantic narration highlighting the craftsmanship of simple toy trains. The short whimsical film composed of close-up shots of trains creates a world of play, much like the world Ray and Charles sought to live in. Continuing the buoyant character, Tops carries on the interest of toys and without narration, emanates the interest of unfamiliar cultures that consistently appears in other films and furniture displays. Design historian Kristina Wilson's recent article. "Like a 'Girl in a Bikini Suit' and Other Stories." describes how Charles and Ray Eames integrated ethnographic objects into their mid-century Modern design aesthetic. Drawing on Wilson's work, this paper will consider how the Eames' appropriation of history and other cultures in their films reflects their emphasis on a romanticized craft aesthetic. In their examination of craft through the inclusion of non-Western objects, the Eames' treated these other cultures as sources of inspiration, creativity, and authenticity. Echoing their other design work, the films of Ray and Charles Eames reveal the Eames's romanticization of a craft aesthetic and give voice to their design approach through the representation of diverse historical and ethnographic objects. By analyzing these two films, this paper will critically analyze the romantic representation of these historical and cultural artifacts and consider how these films relate to the larger design philosophy of Charles and Ray Eames.

During the Taisho era (1912-1926), bijinga ("pictures of beautiful women") artists were challenged to portray a completely different type of Japanese woman from before. The allure of the distant, floating world in the woodblock prints during the Edo period (1603-1868) was exchanged for a modern woman as Japan cultivated a more modern identity. In her article "Flowers of Taisho," art historian Kendall Brown argues that fine artists of the Taisho period integrated westernized interiors, technology, fashions, and behaviors in their work to signify modernity and the "modern" Japanese woman. As the visual language of "modernity" became more common in Japanese art and design, the country was faced with a paradoxical question: how could one be Japanese and modern if modernity was defined as western? According to art historian Gennifer Weisenfeld, the mobilization of women's societal roles during the Taisho era was due to the influence of commercial advertising design and the newfound independence of the modern woman. While working men were acclimated to modernization through occupations in the new economy, women became a key advertising demographic for commercial companies due women's desire to appear modern. Building on the work of Brown and Weisenfeld, this paper will compare the depiction of Japanese women in commercial and fine arts respectively during the Taisho era. I argue that early 20th century trends such as modern clothing, hairstyles, and new technologies found in Japanese fine arts eventually influenced the styles and design strategies used in commercial advertisements to appeal to a modern Japanese woman.

Trains and Tops: Craft and Cultural Artifact in Eames Design

Memory is an increasingly difficult subject to capture in art. Within the growing digital age, memories can be easily called upon through a simple single image. Betsy Toadvine, however, has successfully created works that have appear individual but relatable. Her detail in mixed media works illustrate fragments of inclusive experiences while abstract painted forms evoke feelings associated with the memories. Throughout her use of multiple medias, she creates a scene packed with personal memories that provoke the viewer's own.

Memory is a frequent theme in the graduating fine arts students this year, and they have utilized it in individual and comprehensive ways.

FINANCING YOUR EDUCATION

At CCAD, we want every student to have an opportunity to pursue their passion, regardless of their means.

What's Available

Funding your education at CCAD may come from several primary sources — some of which you may or may not have to repay after graduation and others that you'll never have to repay. Your final award package may be composed of scholarship, grants, loans and student employment. Each student award package is different, and we encourage you to explore all the funding options available to you.

Grants & Scholarships

CCAD Scholarships

Each year, we award renewable scholarships to incoming students. These scholarships may be based on academic ability, evidence of creativity and level of demonstrated interest in the college. CCAD awards institutional dollars to support scholarships for students who demonstrate particular levels of engagement in the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards, Ohio Governor's Youth Art Exhibition and National Art Honor Society. Students must submit documentation during the application process.

External Scholarships

A great number of organizations and agencies offer scholarships to students looking to attend college. It is important to explore all of the options that are out there. CCAD will recognize most external scholarships an applicant brings to the college, and a student's financial aid package will be adjusted to accommodate any external scholarships. Ask your teachers, college counselors and friends about resources to explore external scholarships.

CCAD Grants

CCAD offers a limited number of grants. These grants are based on the financial need calculated once a student has submitted their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®).

Federal Pell Grant

This grant is awarded by the federal government to students who demonstrate exceptional financial need. To be eligible, a student needs to complete the FAFSA and be enrolled as a full-time undergraduate student.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)

To be considered for this grant, a student must fill out the FAFSA.

Students who will receive Federal Pell Grants and have the most financial need are first priority for this grant.

Employment & Loans

The types of aid listed below must be repaid. Take note of this type of aid because there are generally additional steps you'll need to take to receive the support.

Student Employment

On-campus employment through the Federal Work-Study (FWS) Program is part of many CCAD students' financial aid packages. Students may work up to 15 hours per week during the academic year and up to 40 hours per week during the summer and holiday breaks. Students are considered for this when they submit the FAFSA.

Federal Perkins Loan

The Federal Perkins Loan Program offers low-interest federal student loans to students who demonstrate exceptional financial need. CCAD awards renewable scholarships through this program. Students are considered for this when they submit the FAFSA.

Federal Direct Student Loan

These federal student loans help cover the cost of higher education.
The U.S. Department of Education offers eligible students at participating schools Direct Subsidized Loans and Direct Unsubsidized Loans — some people refer to these loans as Stafford Loans or Direct Stafford Loans.
Students are considered for this when they submit the FAFSA.

Federal Direct Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students (PLUS)

PLUS loan are federal loans that parents of dependent undergraduate students can use to help pay education expenses. The U.S. Department of Education makes Direct PLUS Loans to eligible borrowers through schools participating in the Direct Loan Program. Contact our Financial Aid office for more information.

Alternative/Private Student Loans

Private lenders can provide loans to fill gaps between a student's financial aid package and their total educational costs. These loans can be used for more than just tuition, including expenses such as room and board, travel, off-campus study, computers and art supplies. Veterans' Benefits

CCAD is approved by the State Approving Agency and the Veterans Administration for educational benefits for veterans.

International Student Aid

International students (non-U.S. citizens of permanent residents/ green card holders) enrich the CCAD learning and living communities. International applicants will be automatically considered for CCAD scholarships when they submit their application. However, CCAD is not able to award any other form of aid to international students. International students must realistically plan to meet their educational expenses throughout their academic career. A declaration of finances (demonstration of ability to pay) will be required for any international student who wishes to enroll at CCAD.

How to Apply for Aid

The FAFSA is the foundation of the financial aid process here at CCAD, and completing it is essential to receiving a formal financial aid package. We encourage all U.S. citizens and permanent residents (green card holders) to apply for financial aid using the FAFSA — unless you are sure you will be paying fully out of personal expenses.

CCAD is one of America's oldest and most prestigious art and design schools. We got our start in 1879 — and people have been raving about us ever since. Even Oscar Wilde, when he stopped in Columbus in 1882, said he was impressed that "the capital city (has) a leading art school."

Here's a look at some memorable moments and milestones in CCAD's history.

1879

Columbus College of Art &
Design was founded. (Back
then CCAD wasn't called
CCAD, though. We were known
as the Columbus Art School.)

Classes were so popular our first year that First Lady Lucy Hayes, wife of President Rutherford B. Hayes, came to the school in our second year.

1882

Writer Oscar Wilde came to Columbus and in a public lecture talked about how impressed he was that "the capital city (has) a leading art school."

1885

The first class of students graduated from CCAD.

1930

We built Beaton Hall, the first facility constructed just for the school. It had no windows on the south side because, according to CCAD alum Bill Arter, "artists prefer to face north."

1936

Georgia O'Keeffe visited the school.

1952

Joseph Cazani became the school's leader. He oversaw rapid growth and change, beginning with the addition of a diploma program requiring 120 semester credit hours of work and a mandatory GPA of 2.0.

1950s

We added a number of programs including advertising, industrial design and illustration.

1959

We officially changed our name to Columbus College of Art and Design.

1970

The first class of CCAD students with Bachelor of Fine Arts degrees graduated.



1979

Joseph Canzani became the college's first President.

1985

We opened our first residence hall.

1987

We added animation and video programs, building our reputation as a hub for designers.

1993

The Joseph V. Canzani Center was built, giving CCAD our first dedicated gallery and auditorium.

1998

Artist and leader Denny Griffith was named President of CCAD. Over the next 16 years, until his retirement in 2014, he led the college through transformational change.

He expanded our campus, oversaw the installation of our 10-story ART sign and helped develop our first graduate degree.

2001

We added to the city's skyline with an iconic 100-foot tall metal ART sign.

2000s

Student services and organizations expanded across campus.

2010

CCAD launched its first graduate program, the Master of Fine Arts degree.

2012

The first MFA class graduated.

2013

State-of-the-art fabrication space, called the Tad Jeffrey FabLab, was built, housing 3D printers, laser cutters and machining equipment.

2016


Dr. Melanie Corn was named first female President of CCAD.

We introduced two new undergraduate programs — Comics & Narrative Practice and Contemporary Crafts — and a new graduate degree, the Master of Design in Integrative Design.

In 2013, an anonymous pair of CCAD students began sneaking into classrooms and creating intricate chalk drawings on blackboards around campus. The secret perpetrators called themselves

Dangerdust. And even after they graduated, the name — and their anonymity — stuck. The mysterious duo now sell their chalk art online and do work for big-name companies like Target.
