Inspiring teaching

Our teachers lead the way in their fields; they influence policy, shape opinions and publish in leading academic journals. They are called upon to be commentators in the media, and shape policy as advisers to government, charities and industry. Unlike many other universities, all of our students are taught by research-active academic staff from their first year of study. Our size means that you'll get to know your lecturers and fellow students, giving you a more personal learning experience.

Preparing you for work

Career skills are central to every one of our academic courses, so no matter what you study, we will help you develop the skills needed for today's job market.

We have a thriving Career Mentoring Scheme, through which we can match you with a Roehampton alumnus or friend of the University to help you to succeed. We also give you access to CV writing support, interactive support for interviews and a wide-ranging calendar of careers events.

We know it works, as the latest national figures show that nine out of 10 of our graduates are in employment or further study within six months of graduation – one of the best rates in London (Destination of Leavers of Higher Education Survey, 2015 results).

A supportive environment

When you join Roehampton you become part of one of our 10 highly-regarded academic departments and a member of a forward-thinking community on campus. You'll also join one of our four colleges, with all the support and social life that they provide.

There is a librarian assigned to each department area to help you find all the relevant text books and sources you need to excel in your studies. We also offer a range of services for any non-academic issues you may have, such as managing finances or arranging disability or dyslexia support.

You will have an exciting opportunity to spend a semester of your second year abroad, with 42 countries worldwide to choose from. Our partnerships with universities across the globe give you the chance to experience new and exciting cultures, and expand your knowledge in campuses across the world.

Some of the countries where you can study include Australia, Ecuador, France, Mexico, Spain and the United States.

Many students tell us their time spent abroad was one of the best parts of their degree. You will return home more confident, adaptable, globally minded, and more attractive to any potential employer.













Our industry connections

We have established strong links with employers across a range of sectors, giving you the chance to undertake work placements or take part in masterclasses on campus.

Every department has strong connections to industries in their sector, so you can learn through practice and from those who are experts in their fields.

Through a partnership with Santander, we offer an internship programme for our final year students and recent graduates, where you can take part in a three-month paid work placement within a business. We also offer other work placement opportunities across our courses.

Best of all, we are in the heart of south-west London, close to Putney and Hammersmith and within easy reach of central London. 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International students

At Roehampton, we are committed to excellence in teaching and research and we can offer you an excellent opportunity to study and live away from your home country.

The UK has a world-renowned reputation for excellence in education. Everything you expect from a UK education is reflected at the University of Roehampton, from our world-class teaching staff and excellent career support, to our history-rich campus buildings and warm welcome.

We are very proud of our diverse and multicultural student body. International students make up a substantial portion of the population on campus, and this is reflected in the various culture-based clubs and societies at the Students' Union. Support for international students at Roehampton is second to none, and starts before you even get to campus with our pre-arrival activities, dedicated contact support and airport pick up service.

Our International Office staff make regular visits overseas to meet prospective students and offer advice on courses and visa applications. We also offer new international students a dedicated welcome and orientation programme.

Language support

International students who don't speak English as their native language are offered free English language support tutoring if required, this can be accessed through the Information Centre on campus.

The English Language Unit offers more options for support to prepare you for your degree and support you during your studies with opportunities for individual tutorials.





English Language Unit

Pre-sessional five, 10 and 15 week courses

These courses are ideal for students who are offered a place on an undergraduate course, but still need to meet academic English requirements. You will improve your academic English so that you can cope better with university study, develop your study skills and learn what is expected of you as a student in the UK higher education system.

The length of course depends on your level of English. Once you have successfully completed the course, you will be enrolled automatically onto your chosen undergraduate degree course with no need to re-take an English language test.

What will I study?

- Essays: using reading in your writing, organisation, critical and analytical skills
- Academic vocabulary and grammar development
- Seminars: presentation and discussion based on your reading

- Lectures: understanding the argument, note-taking, playing an active role
- Listening and reading: understanding key ideas in an academic context

International Foundation Programme

International students who are not eligible for direct entry to an undergraduate programme, or who want to improve their academic English, study skills and subject knowledge before beginning an undergraduate degree, can take one of our International Foundation Programmes. The International Foundation Programme is offered in conjunction with our partners QA Higher Education. There are two pathways, one if you are looking at progressing onto a business degree, and a generic pathway for non-business degrees. Both courses are designed to prepare you for the seamless transition onto an undergraduate programme.

Academic Learning

How to make sure you get the best degree you can.

If you engage fully, university can help you to develop a whole range of personal, academic and professional skills which will be vital in later life. At Roehampton we go even further to ensure you achieve academic success. We offer Academic Learning Advisors who can guide you how to get the most out of your studies.

Their support covers a range of areas such as academic writing or research. Many of these skills are transferable, which means they will be useful even after you graduate from Roehampton.

The Academic Learning Service offers online guides, workshops, class sessions and one-to-one appointments on anything from time management to structuring dissertations and referencing.

This focus on excellent teaching and learning support means our students thrive: in 2015, 70% gained a first or upper-second class degree.

When I arrived at Roehampton I was quite shy and lacking in confidence, but in the year I've been here, I've really come out of my shell.





Best of both worlds

London is undoubtedly one of the world's greatest cities; home to international businesses, world-famous cultural institutions and the centre of UK politics. It offers a wealth of theatre, food, music and sport and almost half the city is made up of parks and other green spaces.

Explore our local area:

Barnes

This beautiful area next to Roehampton has a peaceful village atmosphere with a duck pond and traditional pubs, as well as a farmers' market, boutique shops, cafés and a luxury cinema.

Hammersmith

Not only is there a huge range of shops to tempt you, but there's great nightlife in the many pubs, bars and clubs, as well as the Eventim Apollo and the famous Lyric Theatre.

Hampton Court Palace

This picturesque landmark was made famous as the palace of Henry VIII and is now an unmissable attraction, featuring a maze and beautiful gardens.

Putney

A classy riverside district with a range of bars, pubs and a busy high street. Putney also hosts the annual Oxford and Cambridge Boat Race which starts at Putnev Bridge.

Richmond Park

The largest of London's Royal Parks and only a 10-minute walk from the campus. It's 2,500 acres of fresh air fun, with woodlands, ponds, gardens, grasslands and around 630 free-roaming deer.

Shepherds Bush

A shopaholic's heaven, home to one of the largest in-town shopping malls in Europe -Westfield. Music lovers should check out who's on at the O₂ Shepherds Bush Empire.

Wimbledon

Home of the world's most famous tennis tournament, Wimbledon has a village-style centre with restaurants and fashion boutiques.

Living costs

Aside from your course fees, there are additional costs that you should take into consideration when budgeting for University. This is a rough guide.

Rent £450-£550 pm


Rent ranges from approximately £114–£165 per week on campus. If you choose to rent off campus the average cost is £450–£550 per calendar month. Some

rents are exclusive of bills and you would need to budget an additional £60 per month. Deposits range from the equivalent of four to six weeks rent.



Food £120 pm

Students are, on average, spending £30 on weekly groceries.



Social life £140 pm

Roehampton students spend an average of £35/40 a week.



Phone bill £50 pm



Most students pay £50 per month on contract or £10/12 a week on pay as you go.

Books and equipment £25 pm



It varies from department to department – on average students spend £300 an academic year on books but using library services can considerably reduce costs.

Depending on your lifestyle, you can of course spend more or less – these costs are just a guide.



Every week there are nights out on campus, such as Bands Night or Acoustic Night, so if you have a musical talent there's a chance for you to take it further.

Sports at Roehampton

As we have four colleges, there is a healthy competition between sports clubs, and you may find yourself competing further afield in the British Universities Colleges Sports (BUCS) leagues and tournaments.

Keeping fit

As well as sports clubs, we offer exercise classes, coaching opportunities, dance-based activities and recreational sessions.

We also offer a range of women only workouts, which are open to all female Roehampton students.

Our facilities include an on-campus gym with exercise classes every day, a sports hall, a studio, outdoor courts and playing fields.

Taking part in sport and exercise has a dramatic effect on personal development, so take your pick from our many options to get active or find your passion in sports.

For the truly elite athletes studying at Roehampton, we offer a range of bursaries and scholarships. You will be following in the footsteps of some internationally recognised alumni. Accommodation

Our on-campus accommodation is set in a beautiful parkland environment, yet is only 30 minutes from the excitement of London's West End.

We understand that concentrating on your studies will be your main priority, which is why we take care of everything:

- Friendly hall reps are just a phone call away if you have any questions

Helping you make an informed choice

At our open days held throughout the year, you can visit our campus accommodation.

When you're planning your future education, you don't want any worries to get in the way.

That's why we offer you an accommodation guarantee. This means if you make Roehampton your firm choice on your UCAS form, you satisfy the eligibility criteria and meet the deadline; we promise you'll have on-campus accommodation.

Accommodation applications typically open in the Spring, before you arrive for your first year, and you can apply once you have firmly accepted an offer of a place from us.

Types of accommodation

We offer a wide range of accommodation on-campus. Every room is a single furnished bedroom with internet access and fees include utility bills and contents insurance. Rooms are either en-suite, semi en-suite (with a private shower) or standard where you share bathroom facilities with other students. All rooms have a wash basin.

Cost

The cost of rooms varies, depending on the type you choose. For first year undergraduates this ranges from £114.45, to £164.85 per week.*

Living off campus

We also have accommodation available in Vauxhall, which includes a private swimming pool, gym, flat screen TVs and chill-out areas. Our Spring Mews site gives you easy access to the cultural and social life of central London. The accommodation is only a 15-minute train journey to Barnes, the train station closest to the campus.

If you choose to live away from the University, our off-campus support officer can help you find accommodation with other students in a similar situation.

Even if you are living off campus, or choose to live at home, you will still feel part of the Roehampton community. There are lots of activities and societies you can get involved with while you are on campus.







How to apply

Most students applying for undergraduate study will do so via UCAS (www.ucas.com).

You can apply for up to five courses at UK higher education institutions using the UCAS service. Please note that UCAS do charge a fee for submitting an application using this route. Once we receive your application from UCAS, we aim to make a decision on it within a few days.

Once you have heard back from all the institutions you have applied to, you need to decide which application will be your 'firm' choice (first choice) and your 'insurance' choice (second choice). During the time it takes for you to make your decision, we will contact you by email, phone and occasionally by post with more information about studying with us.

You may submit late applications up until 30 June 2016; however, please be aware that if courses become full, we may not be able to make offers on late applications. After 30 June you will only be able to make an application via the UCAS clearing service.

International students from outside of the EU have the option to apply using the application form on our website at any point in the year. There is no charge to make an application via this route.

The tuition fees are set annually, and are slightly different for home/EU and International students.

No fees up front

You can apply for a tuition fee loan from the government if you live in England, and you are classified as a home/EU student, and you have secured a place in higher education for studying your first degree or other higher education course.

Support with living costs

Home students are also eligible for a maintenance loan from the government to help with living costs. Part of the loan is income assessed and the amount you receive will depend on factors such as if you choose to live away from home or not. If you apply to Roehampton you will be eligible for a larger loan because the University is based in London. The maximum loan for 2016 entry is currently £10,702. When do I repay the tuition fee and maintenance loans?

You don't start repaying any loans until the April after graduation and only once you are working and earning more than £21,000 a year. If your income drops below this threshold at any point then your repayments would also stop. You repay 9% of your income above £21,000. After 30 years, any outstanding loan is written off.

Public transport

The University of Roehampton is in zone three of the London transport system, just 30 minutes from central London.

National Rail

From Barnes station, the main campus (Digby Stuart, Froebel and Southlands Colleges) is a 10-minute walk and Whitelands College is a 25-minute walk, or a short ride on the 72 or 265 buses. Trains go to Barnes from Clapham Junction and Waterloo in one direction and Kingston, Richmond, Staines and Windsor in the other direction.

Underground

From Hammersmith (District/Piccadilly/ Hammersmith and City/Circle lines), take the 72 bus from stop K in the lower bus station next to the shopping centre (above the underground See page 22 for a map of the local area. station). From Putney Bridge (District Line), take the 265 bus outside the station.

Bus

The University is well served by buses that link Roehampton to Hammersmith, Richmond, Kingston, Putney, Clapham Junction, Wimbledon and New Malden. The 72, 265 and 493 buses stop next to the main site and close to Whitelands and Mount Clare (at the junction of Danebury Avenue).

The 170 and 430 buses stop on Danebury Avenue, which is very close to Whitelands and Mount Clare and a short walk from the main site.

Please note, parking is limited on campus and in nearby streets. All University sites are on or near the A306 Roehampton Lane, between the A3 and the A205 South Circular (Upper Richmond Road).

Tariff points

From September 2015 qualifications are being reformed across the UK at both level 2 (GCSE) and level 3 (A Level, BTEC, Access etc.). UCAS has developed a new way to calculate the tariff points associated with each qualification in line with this structural change. These changes are likely to affect students applying for entry to university in September 2017.

What the new points mean to you

- All qualifications currently on the UCAS tariff will continue to attract points under the new system.
- The new tariff points are based on an approach which used the qualification's size and grades to calculate its total tariff points.
- The numbers are much lower, for example an A level grade A* gets 56 points under the new tariff, in comparison with 140 under the current tariff.
- You'll still need to achieve the same grades at A level, Scottish Advanced Higher, Scottish Higher or BTEC, or in any other qualification you're taking to meet higher education course entry requirements.
- The new UCAS tariff points should not have any impact on your decisions about qualification choices at school or college, or your preparation or application to a higher education course.
- The AS is now 40% of an A level this is more accurate according to qualification regulators.
- You may notice that unis and colleges are starting to refer to new UCAS tariff points from now on, because they know that younger learners start their higher education course research early.
- 2017 entry courses advertised on the UCAS search tool from May 2016 will refer to the new UCAS tariff points only.


Megan completed an MRes Primate Biology, Behaviour and Conservation. She is currently doing field research in Zambia.

The Business School is home to The Centre for Organisational Research (COR), in which our staff share and develop their research in the key areas of: governance; human wellbeing and flourishing in organisational contexts; social, organisational and technological innovation; building and maintaining relationships in business; knowledge, expertise and learning in organisational contexts.

Recent research projects

'Investigating the customer experience of the town centre': Professor Mohammed Rafig's research tracked shoppers over a period of time and produced a detailed picture of consumer behaviour, which illustrated that the town centre is still the UK's favourite shopping destination.

'Exploring How the Balanced Scorecard Engages and Unfolds: Articulating the Visual Power of Accounting Inscriptions': Professor Cristiano Busco's latest study builds on previous research and attempts to provide a better understanding of how the balanced scorecard performs multiple roles within an organisation.

'Challenging Gendered Media Mis(s)Representations of Women Professionals and Leaders': An Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) funded project led by Professor Sharon Mavin and Professor Carole Elliott. The project includes a seminar series for business leaders, researchers and stakeholders, looking into gendered misrepresentations of women leaders and professionals.

Dr Suzy Jagger has developed the first known virtual game created to teach business ethics. 'Virtual Values' helps players familiarise themselves with typical ethical dilemmas they might meet in the workplace as well as linking actions with their personal values. The game is designed to help players develop their ethical awareness by seeing the outcome of their decisions within the context of the game storvline.

Research centres

The Department houses the Centre for Performance and Creative Exchange (CPCE) and interdisciplinary Research Groups in Renaissance and Classical Studies, and Human-Animal Studies. The CPCE hosts regular events, seminars, symposia and performances, exploring key questions about histories, theories, and practices of performance and theatre.

Recent research projects

The European Union-funded 'Curating the Ephemeral' project, led by Professor Adrian Heathfield, explores curatorial practices in relation to immaterial art, both inside and outside visual art institutions.

BBC Radio 4's production of a 12-part adaptation of Primo Levi's *The Periodic Table*, was recently adapted by Professor Graham White. This memoir of Primo Levi's life, work and survival at Auschwitz is underpinned by Professor White's research into the politics of modernist innovations in performance.

Other current research in the Department of Drama, Theatre and Performance includes Lis Austin's work on feminism and pedagogy; Simon Bayly's examinations of the 'meetingization' of contemporary society; Ernst Fischer's work on archiving, documentation and memory; Sarah Gorman's explorations of contemporary feminist performance; Susanne Greenhalgh's studies of Shakespeare in other media; Joe Kelleher's work on the theatre and image; Glenn Odom's research on intercultural theatre and performance; Emily Orley's investigations of the performance of heritage objects; Jen Parker-Starbuck's work on media and animal studies; PA Skantze's investigation of circulations of performance; and Forster and Heighes's work on architectural site, urban design and performance; and loana Szeman's work on portrayals of the Roma, the largest minority in Europe, in media, music and installations.

Dr Olympia Palikara, a Senior Lecturer in Educational Psychology. and Dr Marie-Pierre Moreau, a Reader in Sociology of Education, are working with the Department for Education (DfE) to study the impact of funding on the attainment of children with additional needs.

Senior Lecturer in Computing Education, Peter Kemp, has been awarded funding to expand a 3D animation summer school for young people aged 14-18. The scheme mentors young people who are interested in working within the digital and creative industries.

Dr Susana Castro, Senior Lecturer in Education Studies and Dr Olympia Palikara. Senior Lecturer in Educational Psychology are undergoing a project to evaluate the Government's Education Health and Care (EHC) plans for children with special educational needs.

Angela Colvert, Senior Lecturer in English, received a Children's BAFTA nomination in 2015 for a computer game that supports children to learn to read. She is a member of the team behind 'Teach Your Monster to Read', a series of computer games which support children's early reading.







The Centre for Research in Romanticism provides a focus for research in the area of romantic and 18th century literature and culture. The centre hosts international conferences and shorter events such as dav-schools.







Research centres

The Centre for Hearth Tax Research holds primary sources such as records, parish maps and databases relating to the 17th century Hearth Tax, an important resource for English social and economic history.

The Digby Stuart Research Centre for Religion, Society and Human Flourishing promotes scholarly collaboration in the study of the Catholic tradition and its influences and contexts as well as fostering community dialogue.

In addition to the research centres, the Department also boasts three research groups who explore Renaissance and Classical Studies (with a focus on cultural reception); Sex, Gender and Sexuality (with contemporary interdisciplinary interests); and Ministerial Theology (all aspects of Christian ministry).

Recent research projects

Dr. Michael Brown is undertaking a £570,000 study into the emotions of 19th century surgeons and patients. The project, funded by the Wellcome Trust, will challenge the conventional view of surgeons, including those in the Napoleonic Wars and First World War, who were viewed as dispassionate about their patients - now known as clinical detachment.

Dr. Clare Watkins is carrying out a research project in collaboration with the Catholic charity, Marriage Care. The research project will investigate couples' and practitioners' experience of marriage preparation courses provided by the charity as a way of discovering more about what the Catholic ethos contributes to this work.







Research centres

The Centre for Research in Evolutionary, Social and Inter-Disciplinary Anthropology (CRESIDA) is a highly interactive centre comprising both social and biological anthropologists. We draw creatively and dynamically on diverse intellectual traditions within and beyond anthropology, using their distinctions and synergies.

The Centre for Research in Ecology (CRE) concentrates on a range of topics including the behaviour, physiology and ecology of vertebrates and the ecology of invertebrates in a variety of habitats, including freshwater, forest canopies and soils.

The Sport and Exercise Science Research Centre (SESRC) conducts research into the role of exercise in health and sport performance. It is a multidisciplinary team with specific research focuses on: the biomechanics of ageing; clinical populations, such as back pain sufferers and amputees; health technology; neuromuscular physiology; exercising in the heat; and psychosocial factors related to sport injuries.

The Health Sciences Research Centre (HSRC) represents a multidisciplinary team with interests and expertise in research on chronic disorders and novel therapies, reflecting their growing importance worldwide. The centre is formed of a group of enthusiastic researchers whose work integrates biomedical, neuroscience and nutrition perspectives on health and disease.

Recent research projects

Dr Simon Loader has undertaken extensive work studying amphibians in Africa, discovering a great number of species in the wild forests of Ethiopia, and contributing to a greater understanding of evolutionary biology through his work collecting and analysing DNA data of frogs and toads.

Dr Louise Soanes led a project culminating in 2016 in the reintroduction of the Lesser Antillean Iguana to some islands in the Caribbean, helping to protect this under-threat species from loss of habitat and other invasive species.

Dr Robert Busch is conducting research funded by the Multiple Sclerosis Society and MS International Federation on how Vitamin D protects against multiple sclerosis.



The Centre for Research in Translation and Transcultural Studies (CRTTS) promotes interdisciplinary research that is methodologically informed by postcolonial theories and enquiry. The distinctiveness of the centre lies in the particular mix of expertise among its Universitywide membership.

The Hispanic Research Centre (HRC) incorporates scholars working with, and across, a wide variety of hispanic texts, including film and television, dictionaries, translation, oral history and autobiography.

Dr. Andrea Esser was awarded a grant as part of her involvement in the project 'What Makes Danish TV Drama Series Travel?' The research investigates why Danish TV dramas, including The Killing, The Bridge and Borgen, are currently selling so well internationally and are popular with critics and audiences alike.





Research centres

The Centre for Applied Research and Assessment in Child and Adolescent Wellbeing (CARACAW) undertakes work to promote better understanding and improve social and psychological well-being of children, adolescents and their families.

The Centre for Research in Cognition, Emotion and Interaction (CRICEI) concentrates on areas of cognition that are mutually affected by emotion, social cognition and the discipline of social cognitive neuroscience.

The Clinical and Health Psychology Research Centre (CHP) focuses on investigating the interaction of biological, behavioural, sociocultural and environmental factors in the aetiology, maintenance and prevention of health problems, and in health promotion.

The Research Centre for Therapeutic Education (RCTE) examines therapy as a cultural practice influenced by European philosophy, with particular emphasis given to the relational aspects of professional work, health, learning and communication.

The Centre for Arts Therapies Research (CATR) heralds a new phase for the development of arts therapies research within the University and within the wider social context.

Centre for Research in Individual Differences (CRID) investigates major dimensions of individual differences in cognitive abilities, motivation and personality in the context of experimental, cognitive, social and biological psychology.

Centre for Research in Social and Psychological Transformation (CREST) focuses on interventions and methods that support enhancements in psychological and social well-being, as well as processes at the interface between the psychological and social domains.

Recent research projects

Chartered counselling psychologist Professor Mick Cooper is leading a £835,000 study funded by the Economic and Social Research Council. It will establish a dedicated counselling service in 18 English secondary schools and evaluate professional school-based counsellors supporting young people experiencing emotional problems.

Professor Paul Allen is leading a project examining brain changes in cannabis users who have used the drug on a long-term basis. The project will attempt to establish if regular cannabis use has effects on areas of the brain involved in memory and on neurochemicals that regulate brain activity.

Dr Leigh Gibson led a residency project at the Science Museum to study why people overindulge in certain foods and how this relates to their personality and genetic makeup.



The department holds regular research seminars and events, with internationally renowned speakers from both within and outside the University.

The internationally recognised Crucible Centre for Human Rights Research is home to international experts conducting research. training and teaching in the field of human rights, social justice and international relations.

Recent research projects

Dr Aisha Gill is internationally recognised for her scholarly work and expert advice on legal policy issues related to so-called 'honour killings' and forced marriage. Her research into countering 'honour' killings and forced marriage, which has helped shape Government policy, has resulted in a Celebrating Impact Prize from the Economic and Social Research Council.

Dr Katie Boyle is a constitutional lawyer specialising in human rights at the international, regional, domestic and devolved level with a particular focus on the justiciability of economic, social and cultural (ESC) rights in the post-conflict context. Dr Boyle has produced a number of reports and UN submissions for national human rights institutions

Dr Amanda Holt's recent book Adolescent-to-parent abuse: Current understandings in research, policy and practice (Policy Press, 2013) addresses ground-breaking new research on family violence.

Professor Bryony Hoskins has conducted research on citizenship in European Institutions including the European Commission, Centre for Research on Lifelong Learning (CRELL) and the Council of Europe.

Dr Darren O'Byrne is the author of a ground-breaking core text on human rights from a social science perspective, and more recently author of a major new contribution to the theorisation of global transformations, Human Rights in a Globalizing World (Palgrave, 2015).

Dr Jennifer Melvin's research interests include: genocide; post-conflict reconciliation; human rights protection and international development. Her recent book Reconciling Rwanda: Unity, Nationality and State Control (2015) is the result of her fieldwork in Rwanda and offers a critical account of post-genocide human rights.



Applying for research courses

If you wish to apply for a place on one of our postgraduate research degree courses (MPhil, PhD, EdD or PsychD), you will need to download the relevant application pack:

PhD candidates usually apply for the degree of MPhil (Master of Philosophy) in the first instance and have the opportunity to apply to transfer to the PhD (Doctor of Philosophy) midway through their course.

As the first step in the process, you are advised to contact a relevant member of academic staff for an informal discussion about your proposed research. Travelling by public transport

The University of Roehampton is in Transport for London Zone 3.

National Rail

From Barnes station the main site (Digby Stuart, Froebel and Southlands) is a 10-minute walk and Whitelands is a 25-minute walk, or a short ride on the 72 or 265 buses. Trains go to Barnes from Clapham Junction and Waterloo in one direction and Kingston, Richmond, Staines and Windsor in the other direction.

Underground

From Hammersmith (District/Piccadilly/ Hammersmith and City lines) take the 72 bus from stop K in the Lower Bus Station next to the shopping centre (above the Underground station). From Putney Bridge (District Line) take the 265 bus outside the station.

Bus

The University is well served by buses that link Roehampton to Hammersmith, Richmond, Kingston, Putney, Clapham Junction, Wimbledon and New Malden. The 72, 265 and 493 buses stop next to the main site (at Queen Mary's Hospital) and close to Whitelands and Mount Clare (at the junction of Danebury Avenue). The 170 and 430 buses stop on Danebury Avenue, which is very close to Whitelands and Mount Clare and a short walk from the main site.


Travelling by car
